


TransForm Baltimore HIA

- Zoning rewrite timeline
 - Last updated in 1971
 - Mandated by the Comprehensive Plan
 - Began in late 2007
 - First draft released May 2010
- Goals for the rewrite:
 - Simplify and standardize
 - Support investment
 - Preserve unique character
 - Reflect built environment
 - Flexibility
 - Prepare for future

• HIA Goal

Inform and influence the code to promote health and mitigate unanticipated negative health consequences

- Timeline:
 - Began in 2009
 - Report released September 2010
 - Follow-up continues

Information HIA Added

- Underscored potential influence on health
- Impacts to high- and low-poverty areas
- Role of mixed use/walkability in different neighborhoods
- Detailed comparison of land use between current and proposed code
 - Alcohol
 - Food environment
 - Pedestrian environment
- Recommended alternatives



Interaction with decision makers

- Built from previous efforts
- Helped strengthen links between agencies
- Participation on Zoning Advisory Board
- Interviews with key decision makers
- Continued meeting observation
- Multiple meetings with Department of Planning
- Presentation of HIA Report to ZAC
- Extensive follow-up to further sculpt recommendations



Outcomes

- Health solidly on zoning agenda
- Media attention
- Health Department representation
- Established connection between zoning and health
- Changes to zoning language
 - · Community gardens, urban agriculture
 - Definition of alcohol outlets
 - Wider application of pedestrian standards
 - New use categories and definitions (fast food)
 - Standards for new alcohol outlets
- Policy development around existing alcohol outlets
- Continued working relationship
