A PROPOSAL FOR A RESOLUTION

APIL Resolution No. 32-GA-08

"Calling on Pacific Island nations to support the creation of a Pacific Islands Regional Shark Sanctuary and opposing the United States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration proposal to undermine the progress in shark conservation made by Pacific Island jurisdictions."

1	WHEREAS, Pacific people afford special respect to sharks, using them in our stories,
2	myths, songs, and art; and
3	WHEREAS, healthy shark populations maintain the balance in the ecosystems that
4	support many other species, build resiliency against climate change by keeping habitats like coral
5	reefs healthy, and ultimately affect the fish populations that we depend on for food; and
6	WHEREAS, the latest and best science estimates that 100 million sharks are killed each
7	year; and
8	WHEREAS, shark populations cannot sustain current rates of overfishing and unlike
9	other fish species are slow growing and produce few young, and thus more than 140 unique
10	species are threatened by overfishing; and
11	WHEREAS, each entity within this Association and the Pacific shares the same ocean
12	water resources and ecosystems that are affected by the overfishing of sharks; and
13	WHEREAS, member legislative assemblies of the APIL should consider the use of
14	sharks for perpetuating cultural practices to be allowable; and
15	WHEREAS, the people of the Pacific have led the world in taking decisive action to
16	create shark protections and enforcing them; and
17	WHEREAS, the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, during their 30th General
18	Assembly in the Republic of Palau adopted Resolution No. 30-GA-03 on June 17, 2011,
19	requesting all legislative assemblies of the APIL to adopt legislation prohibiting the possession,

selling, offering for sale, trading or distribution of shark fins, rays and ray parts which

1 underscores APIL's recognition of the importance of sharks and their relationship to the health of 2 the Pacific Ocean; and WHEREAS, the presidents and governors at the 15th Micronesia Chief Executive 3 Summit agreed to create a Micronesia Regional Shark Sanctuary encompassing the waters of the 4 Republic of the Marshall Islands, Federated States of Micronesia, Republic of Palau, 5 6 Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and Guam; and 7 WHEREAS, led by Palau in 2009, Marshall Islands, American Samoa, Kosrae, Pohnpei, 8 Yap, Tokelau, French Polynesia, Cook Islands, New Caledonia, Maldives, Honduras, and the 9 Bahamas have created shark sanctuaries by fully protecting all shark species; and 10 WHEREAS, led by Hawaii in 2010, Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, Washington, Oregon, California, Illinois, Maryland and Delaware have banned the sale, trade, and possession 11 of shark fins; and 12 13 WHEREAS, a proposal by the United States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric 14 Administration to overturn shark fin trade bans in the states and territories undermines the 15 progress in shark conservation Pacific Island jurisdictions have made over the past few years and goes against the overwhelming public support for strong shark protections; and 16 17 WHEREAS, the statutes enacted within the U.S. states and territories are an exercise of 18 traditional state police powers over the sale of products that establish by law the legitimate state 19 interests of ensuring a sustainable ocean and planet by addressing conservation of natural resources and protection of public health; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the U.S. state and territory laws on shark protections do not directly conflict with federal law that primarily regulates shark finning and the taking of sharks within U.S. 22 waters, rather these laws prohibit the sale, trade, or possession of shark fins state and territorial 23 jurisdictions, now therefore, 24 BE IT RESOLVED by the Association of Pacific Island Legislatures, 32nd General 25 Assembly, Hawaii, June 25-27, 2013, that APIL hereby declares that it is in agreement with the 26 perceptive enactments of protective legislation for sharks across the globe and requests that all 27 28 Pacific Island nations end the unsustainable commercial fishing of sharks by enacting a Pacific Islands Regional Shark Sanctuary; and 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that governments implementing shark protections, 30 including, but not limited to, Palau, Marshall Islands, American Samoa, Kosrae, Pohnpei, Yap, 31

Tokelau, French Polynesia, Cook Islands, New Caledonia, Hawaii, Northern Mariana Islands, 1 and Guam, and concerned non-governmental organizations and island communities, collaborate 2 on best practices for policy development, enforcement, research, outreach, and education; and 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that APIL recognizes conservation values of U.S. state 4 and territories statutes that strengthen the U.S. leadership in global shark conservation; and 5 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that APIL hereby declares its opposition to the United 6 States' National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration proposal to undermine the progress in 7 shark conservation made by Pacific Island jurisdictions; and 8 9 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the APIL President shall certify, and the APIL Secretary shall attest to the adoption of this Resolution and that copies of the same shall be 10 transmitted to the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat, United States President Barack Obama, 11 Federated States of Micronesia President Manny Mori, United States' National Oceanic and 12 Atmospheric Administration, and the Chief Executives and Legislative Presiding Officers of 13 each member jurisdiction of the Association of the Pacific Island Legislatures. 14
