



Every Voice, Every Vote Topline February 2023

This study was conducted for The Lenfest Institute via web, mail by post, and inbound telephone by SSRS, an independent research company. The field period for this study was from Dec. 5, 2022, to Jan. 9, 2023, and during that time, SSRS collected data from a sample of 1,247 adults ages 18 or older who live in Philadelphia (939 via web, 268 via mail, and 40 via inbound telephone). The total sample design effect for this survey is 1.55 and the margin of sampling error for the complete set of weighted data is ± 3.5 percentage points.
