BP Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill | Select Species at Risk | Red Snapper





After decades of severe overfishing, Gulf of Mexico red snapper may finally be on the road to recovery. But the oil spill is threatening important red snapper habitat, and it will take time to determine how this may affect the iconic species' recovery. Oil and dispersants can be harmful to fish eggs and larvae. The oil spill tragedy underscores the need to take a cautious approach in setting limits on the amount of fish that can be caught annually so fish populations are robust enough to withstand unexpected and damaging events.
